



AT A GLANCE

- Mogo Zoo:** A few kilometres inland from Tomakin at Mogo, the Mogo Zoo is the only zoo in Australia where white lions can be seen. With around 150 animals, Mogo Zoo is part of a global breeding program of exotic animals and is recognised internationally for its animal conservation work. Animals include snow leopards, tigers, pandas, meerkats, giraffes, bears, zebras and pygmy marmosets. Open 7 days a week, 9am to 5pm, all amenities.
- Franks Beach:** South-facing beach between Burrewarra Point and Longnose Point. Walk in only from Barlings Beach eastern carpark as private property all around. No amenities.
- Barlings Beach:** Kilometre-long protected beach, ideal for families and holiday-makers. Backs on to Tourist Park with amenities including small shop. Closest public amenities at Tomakin Beach. Track to Franks Beach from eastern end of carpark.
- Tomakin Cove:** Small, sandy cove with housing all around, protected behind Melville Point. Some picnic facilities and an easy walk to Melville Point picnic area. Amenities at Tomakin Beach, 300 metres away.
- Tomakin Beach:** Broad sandbar beach that leads to the entrance of the Tomaga River. Boat ramp on river side. Amenities include toilets, barbecues and picnic tables. Dogs allowed from amenities area south.
- Broulee Beach Nth:** Popular 1.5 kilometre-long beach. Children’s wading area at northern end. Amenities including toilets and shopping centre mid way along the beach. Southern end links to Broulee Beach South and Broulee Island Nature Reserve.
- Broulee Beach Sth:** Protected sand spit that links Broulee Beach North and Bengello Beach to Broulee Island. A 300 metre walk from the carpark near Broulee Surfers Surf Life Saving Club (with all amenities) around Broulee Head.
- Bengello Beach:** 6 kilometre-long beach that stretches south from Broulee Head. Broulee Surfers Surf Life Saving Club is located at the northern end, with Moruya Airport as well as the NPWS North Head camping area at southern end. Amenities at surf club and camp ground.
